7.1 The general objective of the discipline	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The general objective of the course is represented by the knowledge of phenomena and laws of Thermodynamics applied in engineering field, the knowledge of thermal properties of technical fluids in view of their use in processes specific to energy transfer and conversion applications, as well as the efficiency analysis for energy conversion processes.</li> </ul>
7.2 Specific objectives	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Development of the skills regarding the calculation and analyses of energy fluxes corresponding to thermodynamic processes and thermal processes, as well as to perform quantitative thermodynamic analyses (energy balances) regarding the energy conversion efficiency in engineering applications.</li> <li>• To gain skills regarding the theoretical and experimental determination of certain thermal properties that are important for technical fluids.</li> <li>• The knowledge of thermodynamic processes specific to the thermodynamic cycles characteristic for heat engines, heat pumps and refrigeration machines.</li> </ul>

<b>10.6</b> Minimum performance standard (minimum amount of knowledge necessary to pass the discipline and the way in which this knowledge is verified <sup>18</sup> )			
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The minimum standard of performance: the knowledge of basic concepts used in Engineering Thermodynamics and the capacity to use the ideal gas model to analyze simple reversible thermodynamic processes.</li> <li>• The minimum standard (grade 5 out of 10) for the written exam needs to accomplish: a) correct answers at 50% of the theoretical questions; b) to solve correctly an exercise with numerical data, which uses the ideal gas model to analyze a reversible thermodynamic process. The exam grade is the average between the theory and exercise grades, conditioned that each are graded at least 5.</li> <li>• The calculation of the grade for the activity during the semester: the average between the seminary evaluation grade, the laboratory evaluation grade and the lecture course participation grade (grade 5 – participation at a 2 hours course meeting, grade 10 – at least 20 hours of course meetings).</li> <li>• The final average is calculated according to the university's regulations, with the coefficients <math>k_1 = 2/3</math> and <math>k_2 = 1/3</math>.</li> </ul>
